HELPFUL LANGUAGE

- General Guide provided
- Pronouns
- Learning is okay!





Traditional Masculine	He laughed	I called him	His eyes gleam	That is his	He likes himself
Feminine	She laughed	I called her	Her eyes gleam	That is hers	She likes hersel
Gender Neutral (Singular They)	They laughed	I called them	Their eyes gleam	That is theirs	They like themself
Gender Neutral (Ze)	Ze laughed (pronounced: "zee" as in the letter 'z')	I called hir (pronounced: "here")	Hir eyes gleam (pronounced: "here")	That is hirs (pronounced: "here's")	Ze likes hirself (pronounced: "her self")

ADVISING LGBTQ STUDENTS

ADVISING LGBTQ STUDENTS

Basic Questions Students May Have:

- Can I participate in the program?
- Is housing going to work for me?
- How do you choose roommates?
- Are there scholarships?
- Can I travel after a surgery? Can I bring medications?
- If I need medical assistance or counseling while abroad, is it available?
- How will I be treated by the locals (or for that matter, by the other students)?

ADVISING LGBTQ STUDENTS

Deeper Cultural and Identity Questions to Consider:

- What is the climate of the society for LGBTQ individuals and communities?
- How 'out' would I want to be? Can I be myself safely in the location or will I choose to adapt to the culture?
- Is there a LGBTQ community and safe spaces?
- Does the society discuss the topic of sex, sexuality, gender?

TRAVEL REALITIES

Passports and Travel Documentation Gender and Name:

- Travel information and identification should match
- Change options here: https://travel.state.gov/content/passports/en/go/lgbt.html
- Gender expression vs. Gender on documents (borders, program providers)
- Medication or instruments bring documentation of doctor's orders

Culture

- Are there relevant laws to be aware of?
- What cultural norms should I anticipate (acceptance, ignoring, interest, disrespect, denial)?
- What about being 'out'? PDA? Sexual relations?



ED ABROAD PROGRAM REALITIES

Choices to make with the student

- Will the proposed housing situation work? What options would work better?
- Roommate selection?
- Will you be out to the group? How can I help protect your privacy?
- How should I address you? What pronouns do you prefer?

Things for the leader to think about

- How can I create a positive group atmosphere for everyone?
- How would I handle a group atmosphere problem?



GROUP DYNAMICS

- Brainstorm: What makes a good group experience?
- Steps:
 - a. Clear information/expectations
 - b. Group guidelines
 - c. Open communication make sure they know you're available
 - d. Language matters!
 - e. Individual connections
 - f. Emotional Intelligence
- Hint: It's not that different than any other group!
